## Win a free trip to Washington, D.C.

**ATTENTION** high school sophomores & juniors! In June 2023, high schoolers from rural America will be boarding airplanes and buses and heading for Washington, D.C.

Don't miss the bus! Join them and learn about the political process, meet elected officials and gain an up-close understanding of U.S. history.

It's all part of the FREE National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Youth Tour. In 1957 while addressing NRECA Annual Meeting in Chicago, Senator Lyndon Johnson inspired the Youth Tour. The senator and future president declared, "If one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the national capital, where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents."

In the next few years Texas, Illinois and Iowa loaded up young people for a weeklong study tour of our nation's capital. The idea grew and, by 1959 the "Youth Tour" had grown to 130 young people.

NRECA began to coordinate joint activities among the state delegations and suggested that co-op representatives from each state arrange to be in Washington, D.C., during Youth Tour week. Youth Tour directors from each state association arrange their delegation's visits to their U.S. representatives' and senators' offices, and educational and sightseeing activities. That first year there were approximately 400 young people from 12 states. Word of the program has continued to spread and today, more than 1,500 students and more than 250 chaperones participate in the Youth Tour every vear.



Former Youth Tour participants now play a larger role in the Youth Day program. Each year, Youth Tour organizers select about a dozen to return as staff assistants – known as "blue shirts" – to

help with logistics. That group helps shape the Youth Day content, from writing the scripts to keeping things moving onstage.

Nearly 50,000 students from rural areas and small towns across America have participated in this program. Some of our Youth Tour alumni have gone on to design airplanes, lead companies and serve in the highest ranks of our government, including the U.S. Senate. Don't be surprised if you run into a former Youth Tour participant who is a congressional aide on Capitol Hill. While several of the alumni work in Washington, you will find even more alumni in your own community.
